
Big Fellow, Long Fellow: A Joint Biography of Collins and De Valera

Collins was born in 1890 in County Cork, Ireland. He joined the Irish Republican Brotherhood (IRB) in 1913 and quickly rose through the ranks. He played a key role in the Easter Rising of 1916, which was a failed attempt to overthrow British rule in Ireland. After the rising, Collins was imprisoned by the British, but he was released in 1919. He then became

Collins and de Valera were both complex and controversial figures. They were both deeply committed to Irish independence, but they had different ideas about how to achieve it. Their relationship was often strained, but they also respected each other's abilities and shared a common goal of a free and independent Ireland.




