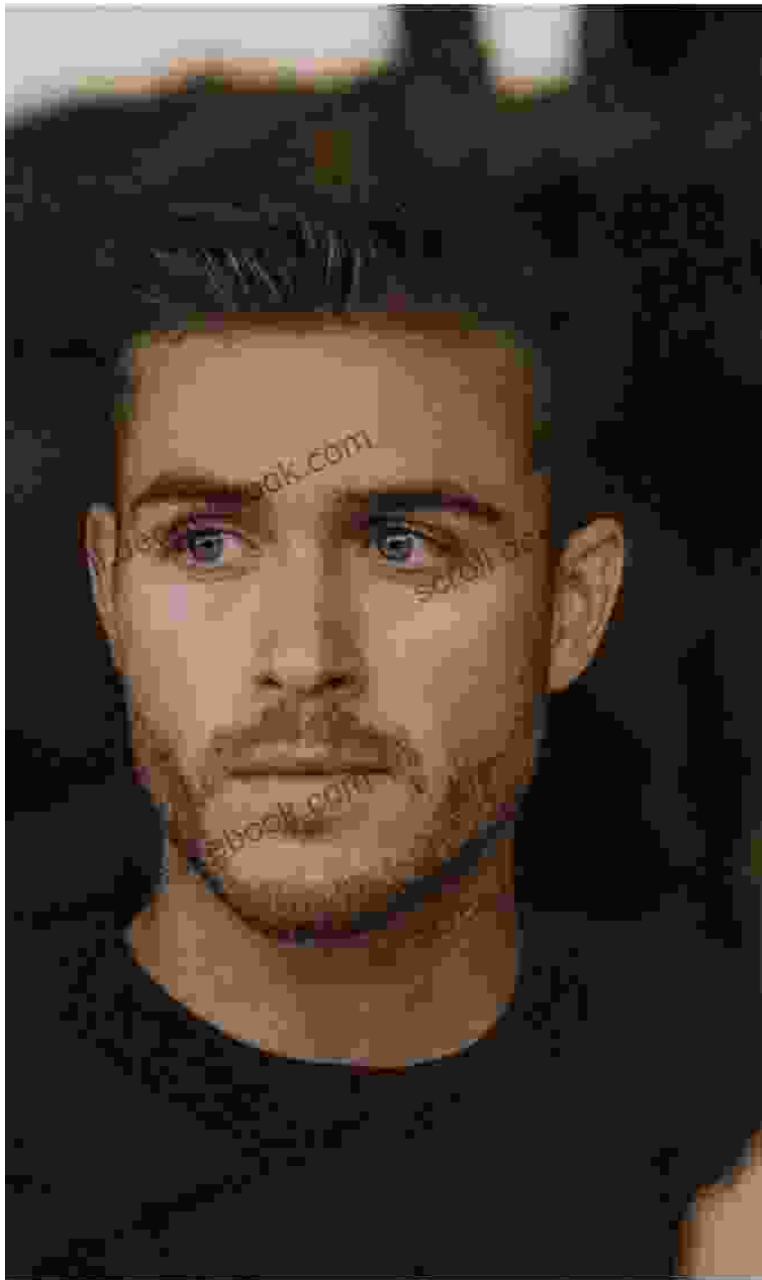


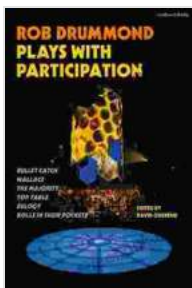
Rob Drummond Plays With Participation

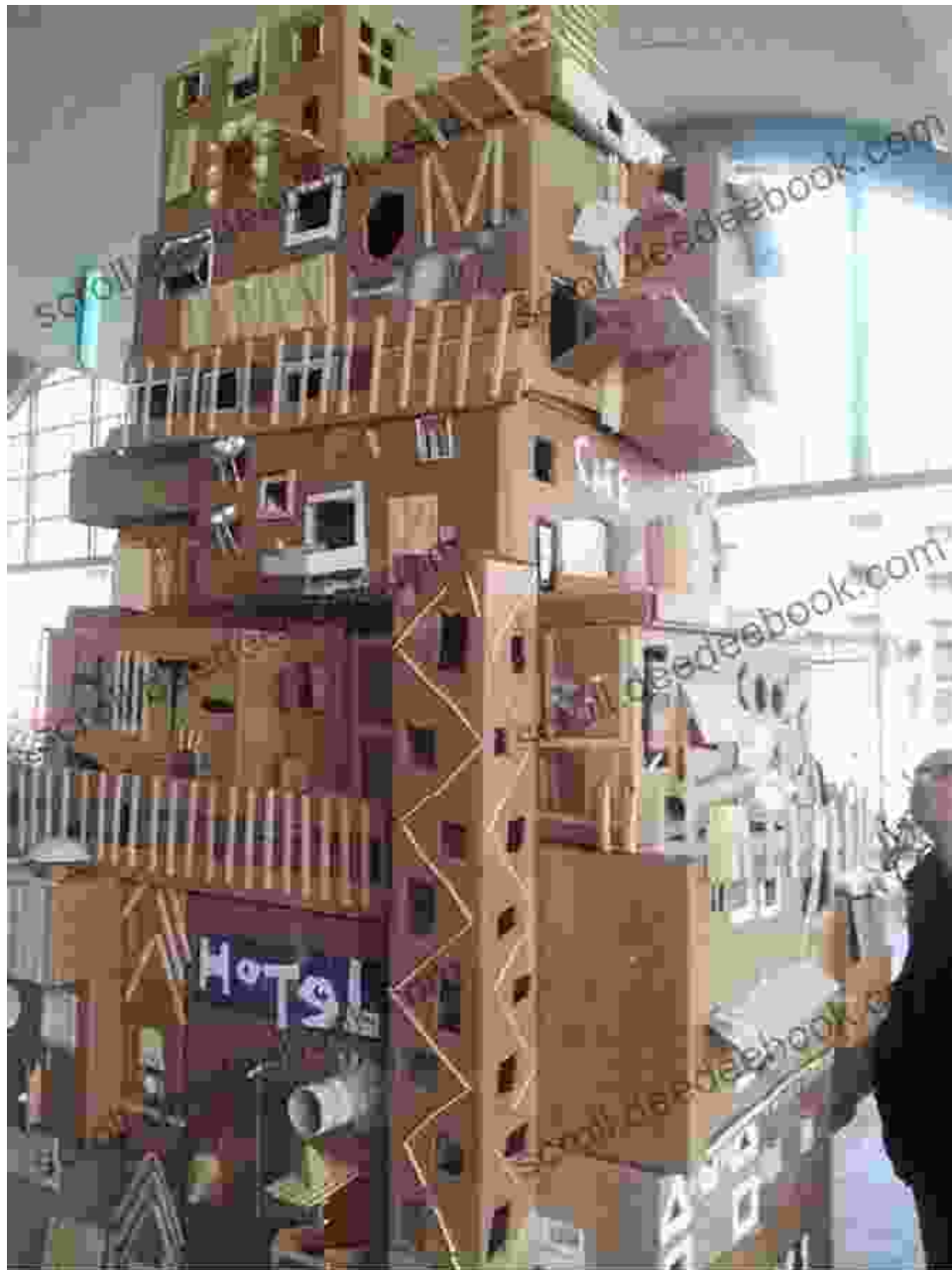

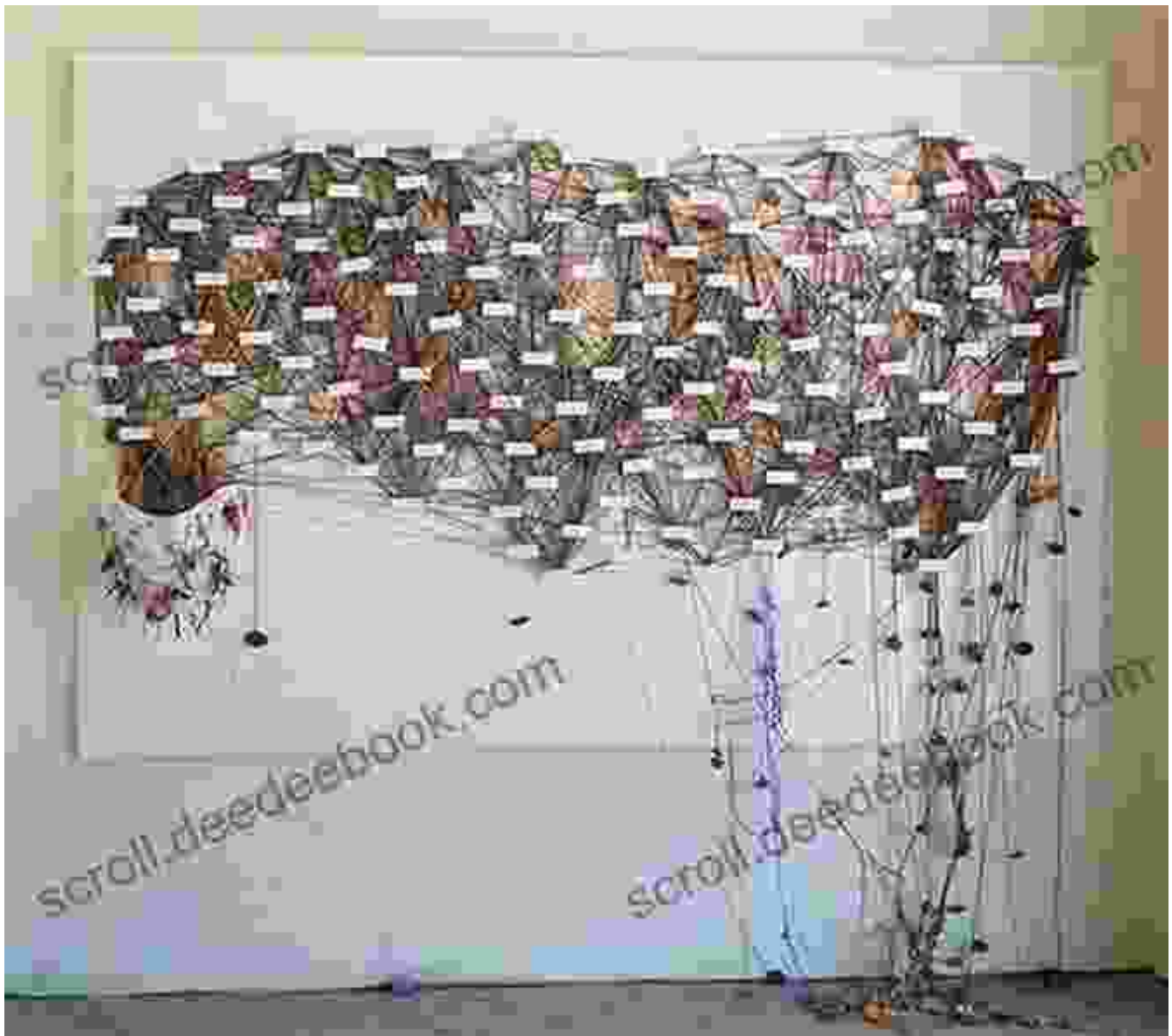

feeling more creative, more connected to others, and more positive about their lives overall.

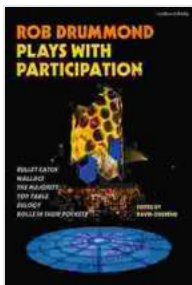
The Power of Participation

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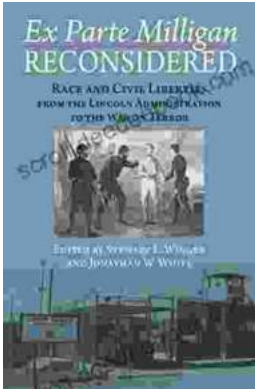
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
