We hear you and we're hollering. Join us in the fight for racial justice and let us create a more just and equitable future for all.



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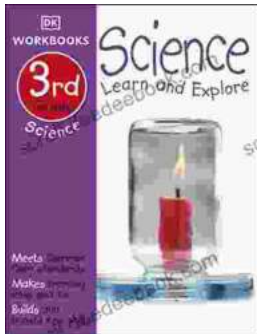
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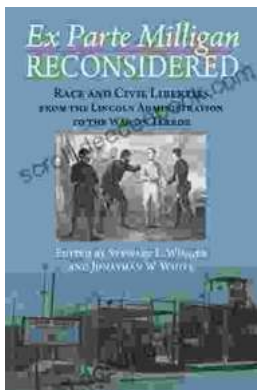
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
